ADI site protesters vow fight isn't over

THE destruction of native bushland and the loss of wildlife has made one Cambridge Park woman stand up for the environment.

Carolina Zakrzewski, 21, and her friends have been hanging banners off the fence of the former ADI site at Cranebrook for the past month protesting against the development.

"Jordan Springs: a cancer to the eco-system" has been the message of the banners.

"It's a cancer that's going to continue to grow until we have nothing left," Ms Zakrzewski said.

"Native wildlife gone, native bushland gone, everything is slowly disappearing in front of our eyes.

"What are we going to have left if we don't act now and take a stand against these developers like Delfin Lend Lease?"

Ms Zakrzewski said she couldn't imagine driving past the site and not seeing open land.

A meeting will be held at the ADI site, on the corner of The Northern Rd and Ninth Ave, Llandilo, at noon on Saturday.

A poster released by conservationist Geoff Brown said invitations had been sent to local politicians, including Lindsay Federal Labor MP David Bradbury, Londonderry State Labor MP Allan Shearan, Londonderry Liberal candidate Bart Bassett, Penrith Mayor Kevin Crameri and councillors Ross Fowler and John Thain to hear residents' views on the bulldozing taking place at the site.

"Together we can develop plans and actions to win the day," the poster said.

"The fight is not over. All governments can still act."
